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## Resting in Redemption - The book of Ruth

After God had set things in order and the children of Israel received and possessed their inheritance behind the leadership of Joshua, it wasn't long before they turned away from God and "did evil in the sight of the Lord...". As a result, "every man did that which was right in his own eyes" during the days when the judges ruled, and disorder was allowed to reign until King David set things back in order in 2<sup>nd</sup> Samuel.
